LIVING CHRIST'S STORY

We now have a starting point that was agreed at the Deanery Synod on 12th July. Our draft plan was sent to the Diocese for them to consolidate into the overall Diocesan Plan. We have not had any specific feedback yet, but the Diocese has said we should go ahead unless we spark controversy!

As you know, our plan has three main components:

- Leading by prayer and worship becoming more like Christ.
- Reaching out, welcoming and nurturing new and existing Disciples reimagining mission and ministry.
- Worshipping God by doing everything as well as we can to support our mission transforming structures and finances.

Our next objective is to form working groups, one for each track, to work out what we can actually do. In the first place this is about defining the scope and objectives and putting more detail to the plan and identifying the first steps to be taken.

To your PCC's and wider church communities, please consider the following questions:

- Do we understand what the plan is proposing we do? Can we explain it to others?
- Are there specific areas where we feel we have something to contribute to the Deanery as a whole?
- Are there any issues which are of particular importance to us?

".... with all evangelism, in the end people have to make their own decision about whether to follow Christ or not.

But evangelism itself, the actual business of bringing people to faith, that is the work of the Holy Spirit.

Maybe I should have said this at the beginning, because I find this enormously reassuring. God is the evangelist. God is the one who brings people to faith in Christ.

And, it is our responsibility as the evangelising Church to participate with God in God's work of bringing people to faith in Christ and to help everyone understand that they have a part to play and that they are called to be witnesses to Christ.

This is at the heart of our call today. To be intentional in the work of evangelism. That evangelism is the core business of the Church. That we understand evangelism as disciple making and therefore part of the whole mission of God to bring the whole creation to fulfilment in Christ – to change the heart of the world."

TAKING THE FIRST STEPS



David Yates produced this article for Trident', our Yarm/Kirklevington/Worsall mnthly parish magazine, to introduce Net Carbon Zero.

It looks at how we might start to turn our aspirations into a reality and is something that we might build into the LCS programme.

Carbon Zero

We're going Carbon Zero from now!

The world is getting too hot (Climate Change) rapidly, and while talking and politics continue with postponed goals for carbon reduction up to 2050, the Church of England (Synod) has decided that's no good and an example must be set. So it is now C of E policy to achieve Net Carbon Zero by 2030.

But what does this mean? Good question because nothing we do, no action, is carbon free. But in past millennia the carbon emitted by humans and the animal world as CO², carbon dioxide, has been balanced by plant life absorbing this to generate growth; however now it has become horribly out of balance as industrialization has generated too much carbon emission (and also methane and other gases).

So Net Carbon Zero is taken to mean in this context a reduction of carbon emissions ideally to preindustrial early 19th century levels, or perhaps more realistically to the early 1950s with carbon offsetting.

Why should we bother? Self preservation of the human race. But also C of E policy / theology. God cares for all of life, so we must care; we are to be farmers not consumers of the earth.

Our (Yarm) PCC is starting to consider this, and it's a series of rather complex problems probably requiring the input an expert consultant along the way. Some headings come to mind, to be





considered:

Heat Pump – Ground source or air Radiators or Hot Air Electric Under Pew Electric Radiant. Whole church heat or part.

Solar Panels on roof.

Is hydrogen instead of gas going to be a realistic option; depends on government policy (not fixed or developed) and also an unknown extent of technical problems.

Costs. How is it to be paid for.

Carbon expended in installation of systems versus carbon saved.

Offsetting emissions.

Of course we are not alone in this and the Deanery Synod Environment Group are working on it, also led and helped by York Diocesan Synod Environment Committee.
